A primary source is created by someone who witnessed or experienced an event in history. It is an original, historical document. It can be a map, a photograph, a diary, letter, or an object.

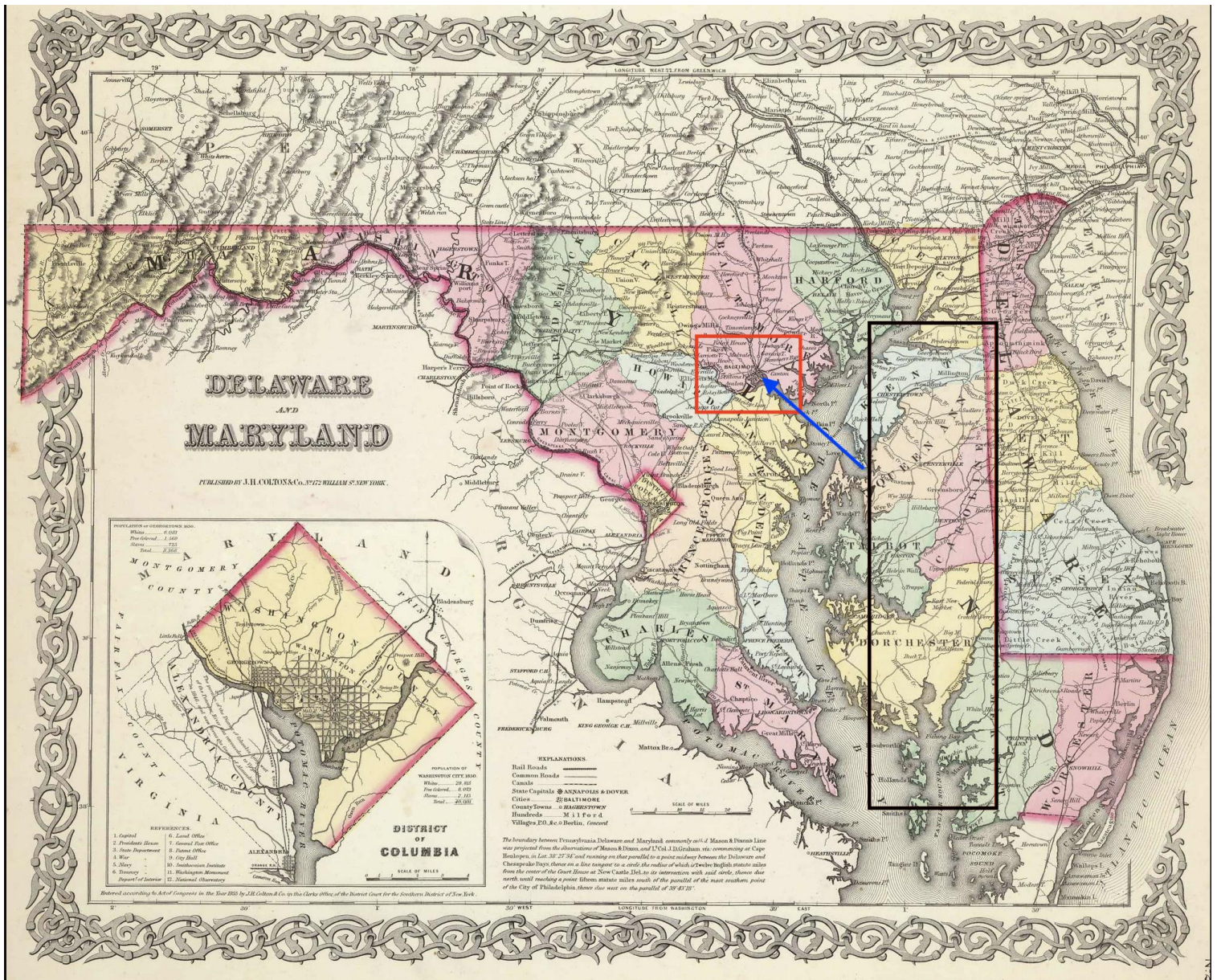

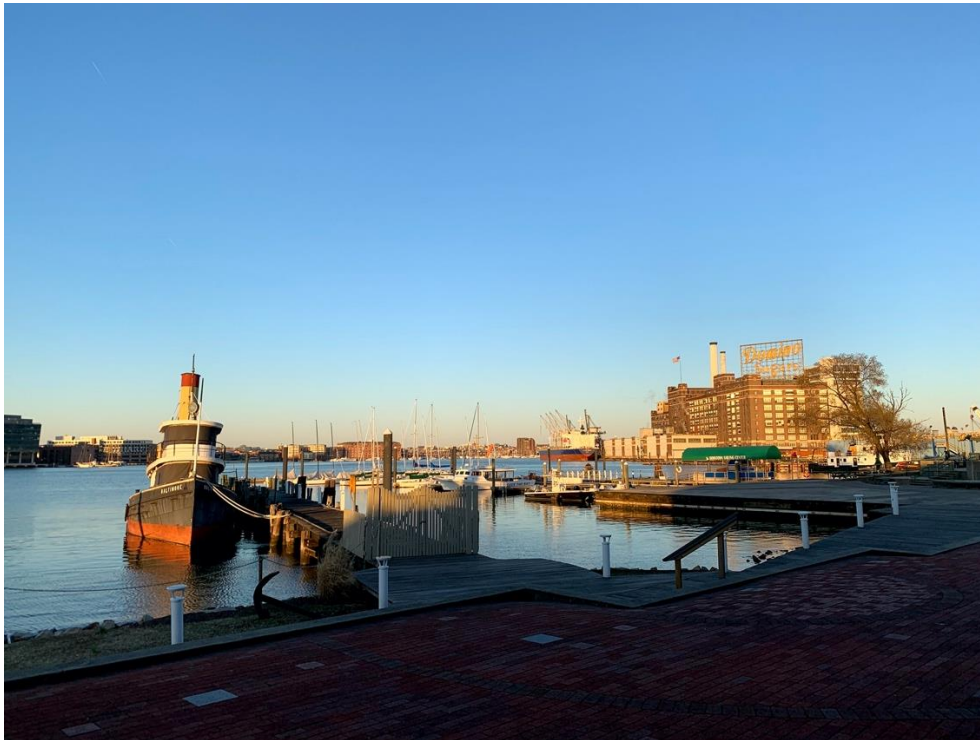
