

In the Neighborhood Pre-Visit Information

Program Information

Description

When our young visitors come for this program, the Baltimore Museum of Industry turns into an early 20th century Baltimore neighborhood! Children take an interactive tour through six galleries and become workers of the past. They are given work duties and are paid with tokens for their work. The program ends at the bank where children deposit their earnings and receive a bank statement to take home!

Objective

Students will learn about working and living in a community, and consider differences between historic and modern neighborhoods.

At the end of the program, students will be able to:

- Identify several industries that are important to Baltimore's history
- Recognize the difference between skilled and unskilled jobs
- Appreciate the importance of technology in the work place
- Understand the basic concepts of earning, spending, and saving money

Preparing for Your Visit

Before taking part in *In the Neighborhood*, it is a good idea to spend some time talking with your students about what they can expect at the Museum, and discuss the kinds of information that will be covered during the field trip.

Classroom Discussion: Pre-Visit

- 1. What is a neighborhood or a community?
- 2. Are you a member of a neighborhood or community?
- 3. What are the different jobs that members of your community have?
- 4. What kinds of jobs do your parents or grandparents have?
- 5. What kind of job do you want to have when you grow up?

Important Words & Concepts

Museum: a place where people learn about what life was like a long time ago

Industry: another word for work

Skilled Jobs: jobs that take months, or even years of training to learn how to do

Unskilled Jobs: jobs that can be learned in a single day, or less

Boss: someone who is in charge of other workers

Apprentice: someone who is learning how to do a skilled job

Clerk: someone who counts goods or money at their job

Stevedore: someone who helps unload goods from ships, also known as a

Longshoreman

Pharmacist: someone who makes and sells medicine
